
How

- The QES happens 4 times a year
- Is open to responses for 3 weeks each quarter
- Open to all types of business: private, public, 3rd sector
- Open to members & non-members free of charge
- Results overviews published 4-6 weeks after the survey ends

Who




As with most sought-after data, we are not at liberty to say exact numbers of respondents to protect the BCC data, but we can say that the national survey is very large indeed, nationwide and tested for validity. Likewise, we do not publish the local numbers to prevent disclosure, but again we have a healthy turnout, which and has always been, large enough to give us solid reliable statistics. BCC verifies this during their regular audit process of Shropshire Chamber. BCC stopped reporting size of respondent's companies after 2017. Typically, the split is 65% micro, 30% small, 3.5% medium and 1.5% large.

Q4 2021 "Our latest survey suggests that UK's economic recovery slowed in the final quarter of 2021 as mounting headwinds increasingly limited the key indicators of activity. The persistent weakness in cash flow is troubling because it leaves businesses more exposed to the economic impact of Omicron, rising inflation and potential further restrictions." Q4 2021 "After the buoyancy of the past two quarters, this quarter is rather subdued as inflation creeps in, and settlement takes place. 




We look at how Shropshire (inc. T&W) is placed against the national picture for workforce growth. November 2021.














We look at how Shropshire (inc. T&W) is placed against the national picture. Projection of how prices/costs will be over then next three months. November 2021.





Cutbacks

In this era of cut backs, data is often hard to come by. The regional statistics office, providing information to our local authorities, MP's etc., was vastly reduced and became Birmingham focused. Now the ONS (Office for National Statistics) has vastly reduced its offer, leaving local agencies without the facts. The Chambers **QES** survey data can help plug that gap, ensuring local bodies have the views of our businesses to work with, when planning the local future.



When

Surveys take place during:

- Feb/March
- May/June
- Aug/Sept
- November

Each is open for three weeks and national results usually appear 6 weeks after close.
